



Animation: Text – Word by Word

ANIMATION: TEXT – WORD BY WORD

GIMP[®] is all about IT (Images and Text)

BACKGROUND IMAGE

Before you begin the text animation, you will download a public domain stars image that you will save as a GIMP pattern and use for the background of the animation.

Step 1: In the Address Bar of the browser, type

http://www.clker.com/ In the Search box type Star
Background and press the Search button.

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
Click on the Stars Pattern



Select a Medium Resolution PNG image.

Right click on the image preview and select "Save Picture As." Save the image in the PortableApps\GIMP\animation\wordby word\ folder as stars.png.

Step 2: Open GIMP® and navigate to the
PortableApps\GIMP\animation\word
byword\stars.png image and drag the
image onto the GIMP® document window.



Step 3: Since most patterns are saved as a 64 x 64 pixel image, click the Crop Tool \checkmark in the Toolbox and draw a rectangle selection (64x64) and click inside the image to accept the crop.

Step 4: From the Menu Bar, select <u>File</u> | Save <u>As...</u> and at the Save Image dialog box, navigate to



Click the + sign to the left of Select File Type (By Extension) and select GIMP Pattern.

The Name text box should display stars.pat.

Click the <u>Save</u> button. At the Save as Pattern dialog box, type Stars and click the <u>Save</u> button.

Note: It is important to type a descriptive name in the Description: text box as this name will be used to describe the pattern in the patterns palette.

Step 5: From the Menu Bar, select <u>File | Close to close the image window</u>.

Step 6: Click the Close button on the GIMP[®] Title Bar to close the GIMP[®] application.

Note: It is important to close the GIMP[®] application as the pattern will not be available in the pattern palette until GIMP is reopened.

CREATING THE TEXT

Open GIMP[®]

Step 1: To begin a new GIMP[®] project, from the Menu Bar, select <u>File | New...</u> At the <u>Create a New Image dialog box</u>, click the

<u>Template</u> down arrow and select[@] ^{web banner common 468x60}. You will need to click the + sign beside <u>A</u>dvanced Options to expand the menu. In the Comment text box, describe the image.

Click the <u>O</u>K button.



A new image canvas displays in the GIMP[®] workspace with image information in the Title Bar and a "Background" layer displays in the Layers palette to the right of the image window.

Note: The background color is not important as you will be adding the star pattern as the background fill in the next step.

Step 2: In the Toolbox, click the Bucket Fill Tool¹, and in the Bucket Fill options, select the Pattern fill option, and click the Pattern icon.

At the bottom of the Pattern palette, click the View as list icon



saved in the first part of this tutorial).

Click inside the image on the canvas to fill the "background" layer with the Stars pattern.



Step 3: From the Toolbox, select the Text Tool **A**.

Text tool options display below the Toolbox.

Click the Font: icon and select a wide font. I selected Verdanna Bold.

Select a font size by typing the size in the font text box or by clicking the up or down arrows to change the font size. I selected 42.

Click the Color: icon to select a text color. Select a color from the palette, type the R-G-B color equivalent, or type the Html <u>n</u>otation: I typed ± 60000 . Click the <u>O</u>K button.

Step 4: Click at the left of the image canvas. At the GIMP Text Editor, type Stars and click the checkbox to the left of <u>Use</u> selected font to turn on that option.

Click the <u>C</u>lose button.



The typed text is inserted on the image canvas and a new layer named "Stars" displays above the "Background" layer in the layers palette.

Step 5: With the "Stars" layer selected in the Layers palette, click the Move stool in the Toolbox and move your

cursor into the image window.

When the Move tool is selected, the Move options display below the Toolbox. Click in the radio button to the left of Move the active layer. This changes the cursor to an up-pointing white arrow with a diamond and four squares.



Before selecting the *Move the active layer* option from the options box, the cursor had two shapes – one when it was positioned on the image window and one when it was positioned on the image text. Selecting the *Move the active layer* option makes it easier to move just the text. **Step 6:** Click on the text and drag it to the desired position on the image canvas.

Step 7: With the Text Tool still selected, click after the word Stars, and at the GIMP Text Editor, type and. Click the Text options Color: icon and select white.

With the "and" layer selected, drag "and" to the right of "stars."




Click the Close button on the GIMP Text Editor.

Step 8: With the "and" layer selected in the Layers palette, click in the image and at the GIMP Text Editor type Stripes. Change the font color to a light blue.

One by one click on each Text layer in the Layers palette, and position as shown below:





Step 9: Now add three exclamation points in

individual text layers, one red, one white, and one blue.



ANIMATING THE TEXT

The next set of steps will animate the text so each word and exclamation point appears individually and then repeats.

Since a GIMP[®] animation is simply a series of frames displaying in a timed sequence, you will need to specify the number of milliseconds (1/1000 of a second) you want each frame layer to display. If you want a frame to display for one second you would use 1000ms.

You want the "background" layer to display on every frame, so you will not animate the "background" layer.


Step 1: In the Layers palette, double click the name of the "Stars" layer and add (1000ms) to the end of the name

Stars(1000ms) and press the Enter

key.

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Repeat Step 1 for the "and" and "Stripes" layers.
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Step 2: In the Layers palette add (700ms) to the end of the "!," "!#1," and "!#2"



layers.

Step 3: From the Menu Bar, select Filte<u>rs</u> | An<u>i</u>mation | <u>P</u>layback... At the Animation Playback:Untitled screen, click the Play button.



Once you have previewed the animation, click the Rewind button and Play again or click the Close icon to close the Playback window.

Modify the image as required and preview again.

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Step 4: From the Menu Bar, click File | Save and at the Save
Image dialog box, save the image in the
\PortableApps\GIMP\Animation\wordbyword\ folder
as stars_and_stripes_mm_dd_yy.xcf.
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Step 5: From the Menu Bar, select Filte<u>rs</u> | An<u>i</u>mation | Optimize (for <u>G</u>IF). From the new "Untitled" window, click <u>File</u> | Save and at the Save Image dialog box, save the image in the same folder with the same name.


Click the + sign to the left of Select File Type (By Extension) and select

GIF image

Click the <u>Save</u> button.

At the Export File dialog box, select the **Save as Animation** radio button and click the <u>Export button</u>.

At the Save as GIF dialog box, add a comment and click the <u>Save</u> button.



Step 6: Close the GIF image window.

Step 7: Close the XCF image window.

Step 8: Close the GIMP[®] application.

PLAYING THE ANIMATON IN THE BROWSER

Step 1: Navigate to the location of the

stars_and_stripes_mm_dd_yy.gif file.

Step 2: Right click the file and select Open With and select either Internet Explorer or Mozilla Firefox.

The image should animate in the browser.
